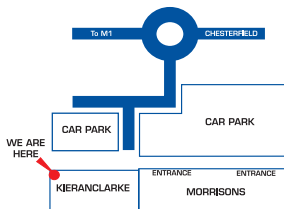

# STAVELEY'S HISTORY



Staveley Hall

The *Domesday Book (1086)* records "Staveleie" in the following terms:-

*"The Land of Hascuit Musard, In Stavelie Hacon had four carucates of land for geld. Land for four ploughs. Now Ascuit has in the desmesne there the ploughs; and twenty-one villanes and seven bordars have four ploughs. There is a priest and a church and one mill of five shillings and four pence value. There are sixty acres of meadow. Wood, pasturable, one mile and a half in length and as much in breadth. In the time of King Edward, and now, it was and is worth Six pounds."*

This was a valuable hereditament and fitting tribute to Musard for his services as one whose name is recorded at Battle Abbey (founded on the site of the Battle of Hastings) as one of the supporters of William 1 in the Conquest of 1066.

The importance of Staveley will be appreciated for the fact that of 270 entries and 335 separate place names mentioned in the Domesday Book, only 12 (including Derby itself) were more valuable holdings; and there are references to only five larger areas of meadow and those wholly in the South Derbyshire.

For 600 years Staveley remained part of the feudal and manorial system of England passing down through generations of Musards and to the Frecheville family by marriage until its sale, together with the Patronage of the Parish Church of St. John the Baptist, in 1681 by Lord John Frecheville Baron Musard to William, Earl of Devonshire (created Duke of Devonshire in 1694).

A son of a Rector of Staveley Robert Keyes was one of the Gunpowder Plotters in 1605.

In 1683 the Manor was settled on James Cavendish, son and heir of the Earl of Devonshire, and it has remained in the possession of the Dukes of Devonshire to the present day. An argument over its ownership played a part in the decision of the Devonshire Family to back The Glorious Revolution of 1688.

During the Civil War of 1644, Staveley was a Royalist stronghold and Staveley Hall was fortified by John Frecheville.

According to contemporary reports, “immediately after this (the surrender of Bolsover Castle), they all marched to Staley House, which was strongly fortified but upon our armies advance to it, it was soon surrendered upon articles of agreement (12th August 1644) and in it we had twelve pieces of ordnance, two hundred and thirty muskets, and a hundred and fifty pikes; and Mr. John Frecheville (who had long held the house fortified with strong works for the service of the King), being then convinced of the goodness of our cause, did very freely, and voluntarily, render to the Major General Crawford all the arms aforesaid.”

It was, however, with the beginnings of the industrial revolution and particularly the smelting and casting of iron and the winning and use of coal that the modern history of Staveley was founded. Particularly so that between 1845, with the establishment of the Staveley Iron and Coal Company, and the 1900’s the population grew from 2,688 to 11,190.

At the same time, to the visitor standing on the meadows above the town, Staveley presents a pleasant contrast of both town and country. Unlike many industrial towns, it does not straggle unduly into the surrounding countryside, which lends to it a pleasing air of neatness.

## PLACES OF INTEREST

### Barrow Hill Engine Shed

The Society worked with Chesterfield Borough Council to restore the shed and it now houses many operational engines including the HQ of the Deltic Preservation Society. It holds open days and welcomes volunteers. It is connected to the national rail network and so has great potential for the future.

### Barrow Hill Model Village

Barrow Hill Model Village was built by Richard Barrow between 1853 and 1856 as a model community. Besides the 247 cottages he also built a school and church.

### Chesterfield Canal

The historic canal designed by James Brindley and built between 1771 and 1777 is now navigable from Staveley to Chesterfield thanks to a partnership between the Chesterfield Canal Trust and the local authorities including Staveley Town Council. The towpath is part of a long distance footpath called the Cuckoo Way. It is acting as a linear nature reserve and makes an excellent walk or cycle ride.

From the recently restored Wharf at Mill Green to the former Norwood Tunnel the canal is awaiting restoration. Staveley Town Council is a member of a partnership hoping to build a Staveley Town Basin in the future.

### King George V Park

A Five acre park which is home to bowling greens, children's play area and playing fields.

### Pools Brook Country Park

Developed by Derbyshire County Council and Chesterfield Borough Council on the site of the former Ireland Colliery. This 180 acre park has 85 acres of woodland 42 acres of grassland and 23 acres of green water.

A Visitor Centre houses the Ranger base, public toilets and community meeting rooms.

Also in the park are a Children's Adventure Play area, picnic sites, sledging slopes, four miles of trails for cycling, horse riding and walking, and lakes for angling.

The park has become important for wildlife and has been designed to encourage wildlife diversity. Ornithologists are particularly pleased at the impressive range of birds attracted. These include Great Crested Grebe, Cormorants, Mute Swans, Canada Geese, Pink Footed Geese, Wheatears, Yellow Wagtails and even a Red Throated Pipit and Siberian Chiffchaffs have been spotted.

The Friends of Pools Brook Country Park has opened an extremely popular Community Café open at weekends. There are plans to extend the opening hours and the Group regularly stages events and provides extra facilities for the Park. Staveley Town Council was instrumental in the formation of the Friends of Pools Brook Country Park and continue to offer support.

Staveley Town Council is a member of a partnership aiming to improve the Park and its facilities. There are many exciting proposals being investigated.

**Ringwood Park**

This 24 acre park features woodland, a championship level BMX track and a 5 acre lake stocked with fish.

**Springwell Community School**

One of our two secondary schools Springwell Community School is a Specialist College for the Arts. It has recently opened a state of the art Resource Block for the Performing Arts and a new Sports Block. As part of the Building Schools for the Future programme the rest of the school will be replaced by brand new facilities over the next few years.

**Staveley Hall**

Was built in its present form by Sir Peter Frecheville in 1604, on the site of an older manor house. The west front is in the early Renaissance style, with six large windows, one of which was altered in 1847 to provide a bay. The other bay window at the north end is original. The east front was restored in 1752, and has the Frecheville Coat of Arms above the door. The rooms contain fine Jacobean oak panelling and original fireplaces, but the Hall has been used as office accommodation for some time, and alterations have spoiled some of its grandeur. The landscaped park has long since vanished, but the boundaries are still defined by farms and lodges.

The digs held in the summers of 2005 and 2006 solved some of the mysteries. Details of the finds from the digs will be available in 2008.

**Staveley Library**

Based on Hall Lane and open six days a week it is housed in a pleasant building dating from 1932 and has books for adults and children, CDs, internet provision and is the base for the mobile library service of the area. It has been used for projects such as Books for Babies

It is now also the base for The Workstation – resources for job seekers including contact information, job descriptions, CV writing, fax and photocopying facilities and free internet access. For employers there are reference books and guides for covering Health and Safety at Work responsibilities.

**Staveley Netherthorpe School**

This school was founded in 1572 by Margaret Frecheville, mother of the Sir Peter who built the Hall, and was originally a Free Grammar School, maintained by bequests from the local gentry. It is an oblong building, with a two-storey porch at the west corner, the upper floor of which contained the Master’s rooms. The Old School is now used as the school library, and contains some of the original 17th century furniture.

Netherthorpe School is a Specialist Science College. It too is part of the Building Schools for the Future programme and work on providing new accommodation to replace some of the current temporary or worn out accommodation is scheduled to begin in 2010 after lengthy planning to ensure it conforms with the current ethos of the school.

## Staveley Works Site

This was first developed for iron working since before the 1600s and grew dramatically after 1863 when Richard Barrow formed the Staveley Coal and Iron Company. This became a major employer in the area and by 1900 it had 3000 workers producing 1,000,000 tons of coal and 20,000 castings of iron per year.

## The Chantry

This is the oldest building in Staveley and is situated in the High Street, a few yards from the lych-gate of the church. It was erected as a Chantry by the Frechevilles, and during alterations in 1904, skeletons were unearthed which may have been those of early members of the family, or possibly, of the Musard family of whom no tombs have been found. The building was used as a Mechanics Institute in the mid 19th Century, then as a youth club, and is now a private house.

## The Hagge

The fine Jacobean Mansion, which stands 1½ miles from the Town Centre, is now a farm. It was built as a dower house by Sir Peter Frecheville, and contains mullioned windows, and a flat-roofed porch, used originally as a balcony from which to

watch the hunting. The interior contains fine old oak panelling, a pair of 17th Century dog gates at the foot of the staircase, and extensive wine and beer cellars. It is reputed to be haunted by the ghost of a lady dressed in white, and was also said to have a passage connecting it to Staveley Hall.

## The Old Rectory

This fine old house built in 1719 on the foundations of an earlier building, and was widely believed to contain a passage leading from its cellars to the church across the road, though no evidence has been found to substantiate this belief. The Rectory's most famous inhabitants were the Gisbornes, James and Francis, successively Rectors of Staveley from 1716 to 1821.

## The Parish Church

The Parish Church of St. John the Baptist stands next to the Hall. The earliest record of a church in Staveley was in the Domesday Book, it was built by Haxon, the Saxon, in the early eleventh century and was extended in the Norman period by the Musard family, who used Saxon graveslabs for part of the window sills. The church contains a fine Norman font dating from about 1175. The Frechevilles added to the church in the 14th Century, installing a high altar, with memorial altar, tombs and fine medieval carvings. A Frecheville chapel was built to house the family tombs, and this has a beautiful stained glass window made in the 17th Century by Gyles of York. The base of the tower is early English, but extensions were added in the 15th and 17th Century by Gyles of York. Clerestory windows were added to the south chancel in the 15th and 16th Centuries. The last extensive restoration was carried out by Gilbert Scott between 1865 and 1869, when a new north aisle was built. A unique feature of the church is the Miner's Shrine, which contains a carving by a local craftsman of St. Michael, the patron Saint of Miners, a piece of coal from Ireland Colliery, and a miner's lamp which remains perpetually lit. A new digital organ was recently installed.

## Trans Pennine Trail

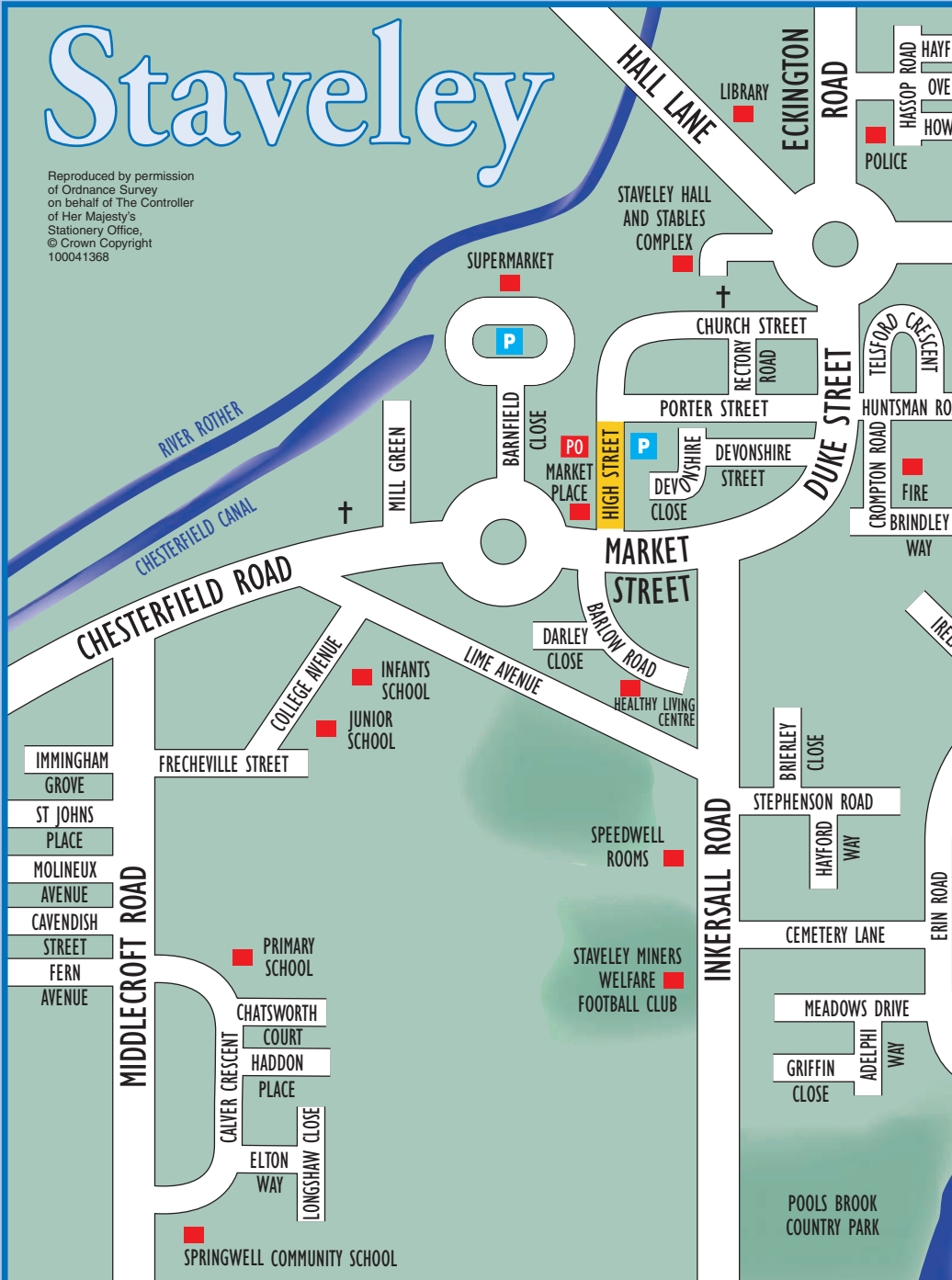
Part of European long distance footpath No. 8, it is possible to walk from Staveley to Istanbul (although it is advisable to complete the section from Hull to the European mainland by ship!). From Staveley the Cuckoo Way goes alongside the Chesterfield Canal some 5 \_ miles to Chesterfield Station. From Staveley the southern Trans Pennine Trail Bridleway provides a six mile route for cyclists, horse riders and walkers to go via Inkersall Green to Chesterfield Station (with a spur off to Pools Brook County Park).

From Staveley the Trans Pennine Trail can be followed northwards to Rother Valley Country Park some five miles. Onwards from there you can walk to Sheffield.

It is a haven for plants and wildlife including butterflies and birds.

**West Wood**

This is an ancient woodland mentioned in the Domesday Book. Work has been undertaken to improve the paths, manage the trees and there are works of art to be found amongst the trees part of Chesterfield Borough Council's award winning Per Cent for Art Scheme. It is accessible from Inkersall.

Further afield but still within easy reach are such places of interest as Bakewell, Carnfield Hall, Chatsworth, Clumber Park, Creswell Craggs, Crich Tramway Village, Haddon Hall, Hardwick Hall, the Herb Garden at Hardstoft, Hodsock Priory, Longshaw Estate, Magna, Matlock, Meadowhall, Midland Railway Centre, Mr. Straw's Home, Newstead Abbey, Nine Ladies Stone Circle, Ollerton Energy Village, Ollerton Water Mill, the Peak District, Peak Rail, Roche Abbey, Rother Valley Country Park, Rufford Park, Sheffield and its many attractions, Sherwood Forest and South Wingfield Manor.

**Affordable Eco Homes Project**

Staveley Town Council is in partnership with a Housing Company to provide an Affordable Eco Homes Project. Located off Frecheville Street. The project aims to deliver 24 Affordable Eco Homes for part ownership and rent. It will also result in allotment improvements and a Staveley Town Council Community Land Trust to act as a body to help Staveley regenerate.

# FOUNDATIONS FOR PROSPERITY

Staveley Town Council (together with many other partners) is working hard to make sure Staveley has a vibrant future.

**BUSINESS**

The Markham Vale Development is one of the largest regeneration schemes in England. It will bring thousands of jobs to the Staveley Town Council area. Important aspects of the scheme include a new Junction 29a on the M1 giving easy access to the rest of the UK by road, rail freight facilities, the "greening" of former colliery tips by willows which will power the Green Technology Centre (offering managed workspace units to small companies that are making a contribution to a better environment), a new road system letting through traffic by pass the centre of Staveley, more of the Chesterfield Canal being put back in water.

Communications such as a better road network, a better rail network and less obvious methods such as Broadband which is now available in Staveley are the key to modern business development. Staveley Town Council is supporting the return of passenger rail travel to Staveley in the form of an extended Robin Hood Line. It is proposed that this should be extended through Staveley so passengers will be able to use public transport to visit the Town, Markham Vale, Pools Brook Country Park and Barrow Hill. Residents would be able to catch the train to such destinations as Nottingham, Sheffield and Chesterfield. Now the terminus for the high speed link to France is complete it would enable Staveley residents to reach Paris with only a couple of platform changes in a matter of a few hours. This is only a proposal at present but one being pushed by Staveley Town Council.

**HISTORY**

In looking to the future Staveley must not forget its past and to ensure this does not happen Staveley Town Council in partnership with Staveley Neighbourhood Management and other partners has worked to set up "Staveley Our Native Town". This will enable the people of Staveley to record their history both oral and written. The Archaeological Digs held during the Summer of 2005 and 2006 showed the tremendous interest in the history of the area. Ultimately we are working towards a Heritage Centre and we will need all the help and enthusiasm of the people of Staveley to achieve this. Staveley Town Council supports the Staveley History Society who meet regularly at The Stables. As we go to press Staveley Town Council has appointed Ian Parkin Heritage and Tourism Consultants to help us achieve The Heart of Staveley Project. This will be a major step forward in the regeneration of Staveley. We will need the help and support of residents if we are to revitalise The Hall and grounds. Check the Staveley Town Crier regularly for updates on progress.

**Caravan Club Site**

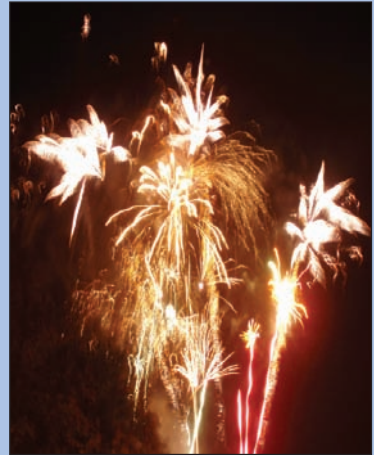
